COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Illustrator II provides students the opportunity to expand their working knowledge of Adobe[®] Illustrator[®] CC 2014 Release (version 18x). Tips and techniques using gradients, masks, styles, brushes, symbols & patterns, color, blending & transparency are just a few of the topics that will be explored. Students will learn how Illustrator files are exported and used in other applications such as Photoshop and InDesign. Adobe Illustrator CC 2014 new features and *best practices* will be discussed, investigated and utilized throughout this course.

Prerequisite: CSGD 306 Illustrator I or equivalent experience **Note:** A basic knowledge of computers is required for all digital classes. Students should bring a USB Flash drive to class.

Academic Goals

Students will expand their working knowledge in both the technical and aesthetic areas of the vector illustration process, from concept to final presentation.

Course Objectives

- 1. To reinforce and expand upon concepts & techniques learned in CSGD 306 Illustrator I.
- 2. To explore the creative relationship between computer hardware, software and you.
- 3. To develop and enhance your **creative workflow**: concept, design & production, output & presentation, storage and promotion.
- 4. To create unique illustrations for distribution via print and digital media.
- 5. To learn methods of working efficiently with digital imaging hardware & software.

Course Requirements

- Students are expected to have all required materials for this course (see sidebar at right)
- □ Students are expected to read all course materials, explore hyperlinks, perform independent research and work outside of class on projects
- Students are expected to attend all classes, execute course activities and participate in individual and group critiques (10% towards final grade)
- Students are expected to complete project presentations (75% towards final grade)
- ☐ Final exam will include all work executed during the semester (15% towards final grade) (digital files to be turned in from each project for final grading)

- **03** Introduction: overview of syllabus, required materials, discuss Adobe® Creative Cloud™, project and exam schedule. Review setting preferences and creating new documents (profiles). Review basic tools, fills and strokes. Review workflow strategies.
- 10 Lecture/Lab: review vector graphics (resolution independent objects) and raster images (resolution dependent bitmaps). Exploration of drawing tools, paths, segments and anchors. Investigation of menu commands and tools to modify paths. Using the Brushes panel to create unique lines and marks. Review working with color.
- 17 Critique/Lecture/Lab: continue exploration of drawing tools, commands and panels. Review gradients and blends. Working with the Gradient Mesh tool and menu commands to create dimensional imagery. Protecting Your Assets (adding metadata with File Info). Student presentations and digital file collection.
- 24 Lecture/Lab: continue working with gradients and color for creative fills and strokes. Review Clipping Masks and introduce Opacity Masks and the Transparency panel.

MARCH

- **03 Critique/Lecture/Lab:** more about **typography** in Adobe Illustrator. Review Adobe's optical vs metric kerning. First look at the Touch Type tool. Threading text through multiple frames. Investigate paragraph and character styles. Student presentations and digital file collection.
- 10 Lecture/Lab: continue working with typography.
- 17 Spring Break: enjoy the Holiday and wear sun screen!
- 24 Lecture/Lab: exploration of the Perspective Grid and drawing in perspective. Working with three dimensional effects, filters and more.
- 31 Critique/Lecture/Lab: Illustrator and the Creative Cloud. Prepping vector imagery for use in Photoshop and InDesign. Investigate vector capabilities of Photoshop and InDesign. Image clean up and file formats for printing. Student presentations and digital file collection.

Save Your Work!

Saving your files frequently with the keyboard shortcut, \Re S as you work will ensure minimal problems in the event of operator mistakes, computer error or electrical failure.

The Keyboard Shuffle

If you're a right-handed mouse user, the usual left hand position is to rest your left thumb over the **Command key** (PC: Control key). Now you're set to press Command and another key to execute keyboard shortcuts and work efficiently! Press Command with your thumb and press **N** with your index finger to make a new file. While pressing the Command key, reach and press **W** with your index finger to close a window or press **Z** to undo your last operation. Your right hand can remain in control of your mouse (or preferred input device, i.e. trackpad or stylus) and you get an upper torso workout using both arms! If you need to use two hands to execute a keyboard shortcut, you might as well just use your preferred input device and the menus.

Tip: recruiters love to see their candidates for employment using shortcuts over menus – it's an impressive exhibition of mastery of the tools (and WOWs them every time)!

A few keyboard shortcuts should be executed with two hands because they are more leisurely in nature. **Command-P** (PC: Control-P) for printing is more of an *expectation shortcut* than *production shortcut*, so go ahead and use both hands to print your files!

Setting Preferences

Adobe® Illustrator® ships with a default set of preferences which can be customized to your needs. User preferences can be set in Illustrator using the menu, **Illustrator > Preferences > General...** or 発K (PC: Edit > Preferences > General...)

Sync Settings: saves your preferences in the Creative Cloud to share across multiple computers

Selection & Anchor Display: Anchor Point and Handle Display options Anchors: the third option, large anchors is easier on the eyes! Handles: the second option, solid handles helps avoid confusion between anchors & handles

Adobe Illustrator CC 2014 Release Welcome You'll be greeted by the Welcome window after launching Adobe Illustrator CC 2014 Release for the first time and each time after that. This window automatically appears to assist you with creating new files, learning new features, getting started and tips & techniques. You can dismiss this window by clicking the close button at the top left in the title bar or selecting the Don't Show Welcome Screen Again checkbox at the bottom right. You can always view the welcome window again using the menu, Help > Welcome...



Adobe Illustrator ships with a default set of color settings which can be customized to your needs. Color settings can be set in Illustrator using the menu, Edit > Color Settings... or 介张K.
